We own and manage 26 homes, with 20 of them HUD projects. We received a grant from the city for rehabilitation work at our home on Motter Ave. With the assistance of Morgan Keller we constructed a new deck and performed yard maintenance at our newest home on Linden Avenue. Most of our houses are staffed 24 hours a day/365 days a year. Our staff arrange appointments, arrange transportation, arrange medications, arrange laundry, arrange a quality of life that makes sure those smiles are in place. As our population ages, we are always looking for ways to provide the accessible homes that we all may require in the future .

Have you been to dine at TGI Fridays lately? Those napkins you unroll with your utensils were carefully assembled by 6 workers of our CLI family. If you get the Gazette Newspaper every week, there is a chance it was delivered by one of our folks as well. We have over 10 individuals in job placements from Fort Detrick to Bone Fish. These jobs, plus volunteering at activities, too, such as the Frederick Marathon and all the coordination of getting them to and from many disparate places falls on our Support Services Staff. Sometimes it's encouraging new behaviors, unlearning some old ones, but it's all about enhancing connections within the community and assisting our people to become vibrant members of the community in which they live.

The Retirement Our Way (ROW) Story

We all should have as happy a retirement as our ROW participants do. 
