Spectrum Disorder (ASD) "how to more effectively handle and adapt to a variety of social situations through a simple, easy to remember, four step program (the PREP program)." With

guidance from the book, parents will learn a number of "techniques to easily apply PREP to help their child develop the skills that they need to be successful in social situations." The techniques include using "visual cues, telling stories, developing scripts, performing role plays, playing games, and mapping out desired behaviors." In addition, PREP illustrates for parents how to employ these techniques in different settings such as while at school, tending to group activities or community settings, as well as during novel situations. A chapter in the book is dedicated to ways parents can address youth that are transitioning, and how their own "mental and physical health and that of other family members can be affected by and impact" children with ASD. The book is available for purchase on Amazon, and it can be downloaded via Kindle, Apple products and Android phones. CONGRATS, Ahna!

Shortly afterwards she started attending day services at the Scott Key Center, from where she would commute to her job at Roy Rogers for more than 15 years. There was a lot of change in Luella's life, including among those who worked with her on a daily basis. But the two constants were her "sisters by chance," Carole L. and

Cindy M. - with whom she lived for more than 35 years. They did everything together, including going to work and church, watching television and listening to music, shopping and eating at one of the restaurants on Frederick's "Golden Mile," or just taking a short walk in their neighborhood. They loved one another very much and pictures of the three posing together dating back to the early 1980's adorn the walls in the house they lived in. In some of the







pictures the three ladies are wearing matching outfits. Luella was a longtime member of Calvary United Methodist Church and greatly enjoyed her time there. Members of Calvary provided her with a variety of supports over 20 years. We remember Luella's flare, passion for animals, her gentle and caring nature and her charming smile. She is survived by a niece and her family at Community Living.





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
