Training is a major component of our support



to our staff, and thus to the people we serve. The state mandates a certain kind of training and minimum hours. We go above this to be sure that our staff is knowledgeable

and comfortable on all aspects of caring for people with disabilities. We constantly modify the training to reflect new knowledge in our field. Most months there are over 35 trainings offered to people in all departments. We see training as an ongoing important component of the well-being of our organization.

By the time this goes to press, we will have moved our vocational day program to its new, temporary home at 520 N. Market St. We thank Frederick County Government for making this space available to us. It certainly was getting pretty cramped in the back training area, but we all were glad to at last have a place to have the JBC workers call home.

We have maintained several laundry jobs and our clients are doing the washing, drying and folding in local Laundromats. Ironing we are doing in-house. One client is at a local hotel doing laundry there. We hope to have another person placed at a car dealer assisting with tidying the car lot, washing cars, keeping the showroom clean as well as cleaning the shop areas. A large group interviewed at

TJ Maxx, complete with finished job applications. When you go to The Great Frederick County Fair, every single Fair prize was tied by our vocational people; all 3,000 of them.

When the clients aren't working they are doing other fun things with our staff. They have enjoyed the gazebo area, and really appreciate the YMCA pool. Once a month they go to the movies.

JBC at CLI is always looking for new job opportunities. Production line work is good, as is anything where 3 people can work on a task with one job coach. We'd like jobs that would be around 3 hours a day, but they can be more. Stuffing envelopes, assembling goodie bags, rolling silverware, performing light janitorial duties, stocking at places such as grocery stores and clothing stores are good employment options for us. 
um and the Country Music Hall of Fame. Ricky also recorded a song and we're waiting for it to make the big time!




Every summer we have 2 or 3 summer interns in ROW and this summer has been no different except that our interns have been helping out with our Jeanne Bussard clients as well. Bri-

we've needed. Each tells me they have a favorite, but won't tell who it is.



hands with a legend. Everyone got pictures seated in the General Lee. Apparently you could hear James' holler all the way back here in Frederick.


The Snow Cone trailer has been very successful this summer. At our last event, held at State Farm, it was simply amazing to see Carlota sitting in a chair. What
