How we help support the Community

Housing

Keeping the 26 houses safe and comfortable HOMES for the 75 people who reside in them is a huge job. There are many facets to this, and we support many businesses in the community in doing so. We ensure that our heating and air conditioning is running in optimal condition and have preventive maintenance done on it routinely and Frederick Air, a local firm, does that for us.

This past year we received over \$53,000 in grant funding from the City to retro fit some of our houses with energy efficient appliances, install energy efficient doors and windows, new furnaces, and insulation. This money was all spent with local contractors. We received other grant funding from both the City and the State and did much more extensive rehabilitation on three homes, upgrading bathrooms and kitchens, and again, we used local contractors to do the work for us.

Vehicle Maintenance and Purchases

CLI owns and maintains 30 vehicles. We have a vehicle for most of our 26 homes, two for the ISS program and three for the Maintenance team. Our house maintenance team has be-



come well versed in also performing minor maintenance on our vehicles as well as the work they do on our homes. When the task needs more knowledge than they possess, we stick with a local service center, not

even going with a chain.....we believe in Frederick! This year's budget allocates \$34,000 for repairs for all 30 vehicles, an amazingly low total when you consider every car is on the road every day. We have 7 vehicles with wheelchair lifts that are at the end of their life span.

Our budget for gasoline is huge: \$75,000. It would be nice if we could purchase an entire

lets yearly, completes minor (in my opinion major!!!) upgrades to kitchens and other rooms in the houses. They keep gutters cleaned, newel posts tight, washers running and countless other tasks, spending money at local hardware stores buying all the little bits and pieces needed to keep a home in good repair.

In addition, we spend a great deal of money keeping o u r h o m e s equipped. Bedding, towels, eating utensils, area rugs, glasses, plates, dish



racks, living room TVs, sofas, dryers, shower curtains, pots, pans, spatulas all come from the CLI budget and all are things we purchase locally. We appreciate the donations of these items when we get them, too, but things just have a habit of wearing out!

fleet of compact, energy, efficient vehicles but that just isn't possible. Some of our homes have residents with behavior issues who cannot sit side by side and a van is the only workable option for outings for this house. Many of our older residents need the ease of a full size or 4 door car for getting in and out of a vehicle. A house with two staff and three residents needs a van to transport themselves anywhere. If we can use a small car we do when practical.

This leads us to our rapidly growing ISS program. There are only 2 vehicles assigned to the 33 participants in it. Our capital budget this year has allotted funds to purchase one vehicle from a local car dealer, probably a replacement for an aging vehicle. This means that funds to add a vehicle to the ISS fleet must come from donations. This vehicle, too, needs to be a van, as the ISS people often have physical disabilities needing the flexibility a van can bring.

Support Services

Community Living is experiencing its fastest and largest area of growth in the area of Independent Support Services. SS clients range from people living at home with their families to living independently needing assistance. If they are living at home, the goals can be multifold: to provide a bit more assistance than the person they are living with can provide, either because the caregiver is aging or the client is aging or to help the client transition to independence. The types of assistance offered are wide ranging: from activities of daily living (bathing, feeding, toileting) to assisting with Dr. visits and going to Adventure World, it is all about choice. We thought we would take a moment to introduce you to some of our newest participants.

Susan or ("Susie" as she likes to be called) was born in Maryland on February 8, 1961. She currently lives in a townhouse in Walkersville with her sister, Donna. Susie is her own guardian and lives in the least restrictive setting allowing her to receive unique supports from CLI. Since joining CLI in September 2011, Susie has maintained her job at the Jeanne Bussard Center and began par-

ticipating in the Special Olympics floor hockey skills and basketball skills. Susie enjoys engaging in at least one social and/or recreational activity per week and she is a regular at Civitan's monthly Karaoke events.



Linda M. joined CLI in May 2011and she currently lives with her father Lewis (Lew) and their dog, Koa in Frederick. Linda decided to come to CLI because she heard from Linda W. how fun CLI was. She wanted to become more independent and join the great outings. Iman lives in a one-bedroom apartment right here in Frederick. He is very independent and takes care of most tasks of daily living on his own with a few minor exceptions. Iman is relatively new to CLI but he is quickly becoming one of the guys. When he is not working at the Scott Key Center, he is out and about enjoying the
